INTRODUCTION

This exhibition marks the Scottish premiere of Mike Kelley's remarkable *Mobile Homestead* film trilogy, made between 2010 and 2011 in the artist's hometown of Detroit.

When invited to create a public art project with the internationally acclaimed commissioning organisation Artangel, Kelley suggested embarking on a long-term project in the city where he was born and spent his formative years before settling in Los Angeles in the mid-1970s. In 2009, discussions with the Museum of Contemporary Art Detroit (MOCAD) led to the realisation of *Mobile Homestead*.

Mobile Homestead is a full-scale replica of the single-story ranch-style house that Kelley grew up in, located in the Detroit suburb of Westland. Replicating the artist's original family home, this new 'homestead' was conceived as a place to house a variety of community activities including a community gallery and meeting space. Kelley, who died in 2012, was determined that *Mobile Homestead* be relevant to the cultural interests of local people in the city. In that spirit, the structure was designed with a removable facade. When mounted on a lorry, it is close in size to a conventional mobile home, and can be driven around the city and its environs, offering public services and interacting with citizens on its travels.

On 25 September 2010, *Mobile Homestead* made its maiden voyage from the grounds of MOCAD to the 'mother ship', Kelley's original home in the suburbs.

The first two films projected in the gallery chart the homestead's journey along one particular street, Michigan Avenue, charting the historic 'white flight' movement of people that occurred in the mid-1960s in Detroit as the decline of the automobile industry and increasing racial tensions caused an exodus of middle-class white communities from the city centre. The footage of this extraordinary road trip is interspersed with interviews that chronicle the varied lives of those who had come to populate the area at a moment when the city was questioning its post-industrial prospects and future development.

On its way up and down Michigan Avenue, one of Detroit's main arteries and a passageway to the western suburbs, the homestead passes through some of the city's most historic neighbourhoods such as the old Irish area of Corktown; Dearborn, the home of the Ford motor company, the Henry Ford Museum and Greenfield Village (containing Ford's personal collection of homes and structures associated with great Americans such as Thomas Edison, the Wright Brothers and Rosa Parks); Inkster; Wayne (where Kelley attended Catholic school); and finally Westland where the former Kelley family home still stands.

The third film work in the trilogy documents the ‘christening’ and launch of the work as a permanent fixture back at the museum, where it remains today. MOCAD’s Department of Education and Public Engagement continues to work with local organisations and individuals to make the ground floor of *Mobile Homestead* a flexible community centre which provides space for projects, events, gatherings, conversations and displays that are created by and for a diverse range of people in the city. Rather than projecting specific ideas out into the world, *Mobile Homestead* invites the community’s ideas in and visitors are encouraged to suggest events, projects and exhibitions.

Beneath the public rooms on the ground floor of the homestead at MOCAD, a complex basement area was built that mirrors the floor plan of the original family home. Unlike the ground floor community spaces and the mobile facade, the lower levels are intended, in Kelley’s words, “for private rites of an aesthetic nature.” The underground is therefore reserved for covert, private use and is not accessible to the public: it is used on an occasional basis by invited artists and art groups. You can see some details of this subterranean aspect of the project in the display of Kelley’s *Mobile Homestead Swag Lamp* in the gallery. Suspended from the ceiling, and functioning both as an architectural design model and domestic light, this sculpture is an aluminium and steel model of the plan for the three levels of *Mobile Homestead*, both above ground and below.

Finally, at the back of the gallery visitors can see a map of Detroit, charting the journey of the homestead across the city in 2010. Numbers on the map correspond to a series of photographs of the area taken at the time, giving a further glimpse into these neighbourhoods: the homes, businesses, monuments and public spaces making up this cross-section of a city.

We are delighted to be presenting this work at DCA in partnership with Artangel and the Mike Kelley Foundation, at a time when we as citizens of Dundee are looking to the future of our own city and the promise it holds.

To date, UNESCO have awarded this accolade to 30 cities around the world in recognition of their contribution to the global design industry.

ABOUT THE ARTIST

Mike Kelley (b. 1954, Detroit, d. 2012, Los Angeles) is widely considered one of the most influential artists of our time. Irreverent but deeply informed, topical yet visionary, Kelley worked in a startling array of genres and styles, including performance, installation, drawing, painting, video, photography, sound, text, and sculpture. He also worked on curatorial projects; collaborated with many other artists and musicians; and left a formidable body of critical and creative writing.

Throughout his career Kelley sought to understand the cultures around him from the bottom up; he mined popular culture and both modernist and alternative traditions, which he set in relation to relentless self and social examinations.

He received his BA in 1976 from the University of Michigan, Ann Arbor, and his MFA in 1978 from California Institute of the Arts, Valencia. Major exhibitions include *Categorical Imperative and Morgue*, Van Abbemuseum, Stedelijk, The Netherlands (2000); *Sod and Sodie Sock* (with Paul McCarthy), Biennale d'art contemporain de Lyon, Institut d'art contemporain, France (2003); *Mike Kelley—The Uncanny*, Tate Liverpool, England (2004, travelled to MUMOK, Museum of Modern Art, Vienna); *Profounders* vertes Musée du Louvre, Paris (2006); *Day is Done Judson Church Dance*, Judson Memorial Church, New York (2009); *Themes and Variations from 35 Years*, The Stedelijk Museum, Amsterdam (2012); *Mobile Homestead*, Museum of Contemporary Art Detroit, Michigan (2013); Centre Pompidou, Paris (2013); *An Homage to Mike Kelley*, MoMA PS1, New York (2013); and Museum of Contemporary Art, Los Angeles (2014).

Might it be possible for film to transcribe something as ephemeral as human warmth? Human affection? Human presence, trust and submission? What about love? Can film bear witness to love? Teach us about love? Express love? How can a lens invoke these very personal, subjective experiences? These are some of the questions posed by Margaret Salmon in her newly commissioned work for Gallery 1 at DCA.

Margaret Salmon (b. 1975, New York) lives and works in Glasgow. She completed undergraduate studies at the School of Visual Arts, New York (1998), before going on to graduate from the MFA programme at the Royal College of Art, London (2003). Solo exhibitions of her work have been held at institutions including Staatsgalerie Stuttgart (2015); Contemporary Art Museum St. Louis, USA (2011); Witte de With Centre for Contemporary Art, Rotterdam (2007); Whitechapel Art Gallery, London (2007) and Collective Gallery, Edinburgh (2006). Her work has been featured in film festivals and major international survey exhibitions, including the Berlin Biennale (2010) and Venice Biennale (2007). In 2006 Salmon won the inaugural MaxMara Art Prize for Women. She is represented by Office Baroque, Brussels.

Lorna Macintyre


Pieces of You Are Here

Scottish artist Lorna Macintyre uses a broad spectrum of influential touchstones in her work, from poetry and literature to archaeology and symbolism. These references often create an oblique structure underlying her photographic and sculptural artworks, lending a form for a composition or providing the impetus behind her choice of materials. This exhibition will mark Macintyre's first solo exhibition in a major UK institution, debuting a new body of work commissioned for Gallery 2 at DCA.

Lorna Macintyre (b. 1977 Glasgow) is an artist based in Glasgow. Having studied for both a BA (1999) and MFA (2007) at the Glasgow School of Art, she now also works there as a visiting lecturer in Fine Art. Macintyre's recent solo exhibitions include: *Spolia*, Cample Line, Dumfriesshire (2017); *Much Marcle*, Chapter, Cardiff (2016); *Material Language or All Truths Wait in All Things*, Mary Mary, Glasgow (2015); *Solid Objects*, Glasgow Project Room (2015); and *Four Paper Fugues*, Mount Stuart, Isle of Bute, part of GENERATION, 25 Years of Contemporary Art in Scotland, (2014). She is represented by Mary Mary, Glasgow.
