INTRODUCTION

Hiraki Sawa has worked closely with Dundee Contemporary Arts to create an exhibition that features key examples of his videos and animations from the last decade, alongside a newly commissioned film shot at Dundee's much-loved Mills Observatory.

The title of this exhibition, *Lenticular*, is an adjective that means 'lens-shaped'. This title was chosen in response to the artist's interest in clouds and galaxies, which are often described in this way due to their shape. It also refers to a special process used in printing to animate images - a technique Sawa has used in conjunction with DCA Print Studio to produce a new print edition.

Hiraki Sawa was born in 1977 in Ishikawa, Japan and lives and works in London. He studied Sculpture at the Slade School of Fine Art (MFA) and Fine Art at the University of East London (BA). Significant exhibitions of Sawa's work have been presented by Chisenhale Gallery, London; Kresge Art Museum, Michigan; and the Hiroshima City Museum of Contemporary Art. Sawa featured in the group exhibition *Behind Closed Doors* at DCA in 2005.

Lenticular has been programmed in partnership with Discovery Film Festival, Scotland's International Film Festival for Young Audiences. Held annually at DCA, the festival brings the best in international film for children and young people, along with an exhibition in the Galleries and a packed programme of workshops and events for all the family. WORKS IN THE EXHIBITION

Entrance

Airliner, 2003 Video, colour 3m

Installed at DCA Box Office, *Airliner* is a short film of a hand flicking through a book. This seemingly mundane action becomes, in Hiraki Sawa's imaginative hands, a mesmerising flickbook of planes flying off or across the page. The work is installed to resemble the information monitors at airports, however the imagery is of the planes themselves and not the flight schedule. Much of Sawa's early video and sculptural work stems from a love of watching planes land or take-off. His grandmother used to take him to the airport as a child and he continued this fascination when he moved to London in the mid 1990s.

Gallery 1

Inhere, 2004 Video, colour 2m 40s

Working with the Hayward Gallery and Lambeth Council, the artist engaged with a group of eight year old children to produce drawings which were animated to create magical journeys within an interior world. The video begins with the children's drawings before cutting into the ordinary domestic world, focusing on a washing machine door where we suddenly encounter spaceships. A further view through a kitchen window sees vehicles in flight and finally a rollercoaster and a ferris wheel can be seen in a goldfish bowl. The washing machine door, the kitchen window and the goldfish bowl are all lenses to be looked through, in which Sawa distils his own memories of childhood in tandem with the perspective of these young children.

Unseen Park, 2006 HD video, colour with audio 8m 40s

Sawa developed his ideas from *Inhere* further with *Unseen Park*. On this occasion, the work was made with the assistance of a group of nine year old Taiwanese children who were asked to imagine being transported by makebelieve vehicles. The resultant animation features a soundtrack by Dale Berning playing a music box - a small instrument which produces sounds by the use of a set of pins placed on a revolving cylinder that plucks the tuned teeth of a steel comb.

Gallery 2

Elsewhere, 2003 Video, black and white 7m 40s

In the last of his early works in the exhibition, Sawa uses the same domestic interior setting, but this time it is the household objects that sprout legs and walk around, transforming everyday objects into moving, living things. Sawa's smart use of flat screen technology housed within an old fashioned wooden box is typical of his use of ancient and modern means of display. The scale is in sharp contrast with the newer works in the exhibition.

Lenticular, 2013

HD video with audio, colour, mixed media assemblage 6m

For his exhibition at DCA, Hiraki Sawa has created a new film shot at Dundee's Mills Observatory. The work was inspired by and features Robert Law, the self-taught astronomer employed by the Observatory, who shared his vast knowledge of the solar system and the stars beyond with the artist. The star map image is sourced from ESO/S.Brunier (www.eso.org). This newly commissioned work is a loose portrait of the astronomer and the planetarium itself. The work is presented in two channels, one of which is projected into a dome from a projector housed in old wooden cases. The strong sculptural presence in this work references works from the artist's earliest expressions as a sculpture student in the late 1990s. The dome evokes the planetarium and the architecture of the Observatory. For the soundtrack, Sawa has collaborated with Tokyo based musician Fumitake Tamura, better known as Bun. Tamura studied Classical and Contemporary Classical Music Composition at Tokyo University of Art, but his sound draws on hip hop, electronica, dub, jazz and drone. In 2011, he released the LP Bird on Ryuichi Sakamoto's Commons label. Tamura founded the label Tamura, and has released three albums. His latest LP is Minimalism (2013).

Aurora, 2013 HD video 1m

Sawa benefited from a grant from the Gotoh Memorial Foundation in 2012-13 which enabled the artist to travel across North America. After three flights to reach the Northwest Territories of Canada, Sawa filmed *Aurora* in freezing temperatures in his chosen location in of Yellowknife. The work is mirrored vertically, making the phenomenon of the Northern Lights and shooting stars even more spectacular. *Aurora* has also been realised as a lenticular printed edition in collaboration with DCA Print Studio.

Lineament, 2012

Dual channel HD video with audio, colour 18m 47s

Lineament is a work that raises questions about memory, fiction and reality. Based on the experiences of a friend of the artist who suffered from amnesia, this video features the motif of an unravelling vinyl record which captures the uncertainty of remembered experience. The work is accompanied by a score composed by Dale Berning and cellist Ute Kanngiesser, which has been pressed onto vinyl and is played in the gallery. The act of placing the needle on the record acts as trigger for the films to be projected onto two large screens. Both Lineament and Lenticular incorporate turning clockwork mechanisms and both are synchronised so that only one plays at a time in the gallery.

Souvenir, 2012

Five channel video, colour and black and white Continuous loops

In the end gallery, Sawa has selected five movies from the artist's collection of filmic memories from his road trip across America in 2012. Four are presented on specially constructed screens whilst a fifth is projected using a short throw lens.
