At first sight, the recent works of this young Brazilian artist (born Rio de Janeiro in 1964) appear as ethereal, abstract sculptures, occupying an area between the architectural and the organic, between the building and the body.

Experienced in the flesh, however, they also encourage a fusion of the senses: smell, sight and touch are all equally stimulated by these complex but immensely enjoyable works. Brought to life by the participation of the viewer, who is encouraged to enter the large naves (literally vessels or ships), Neto's work allows us an unusual sensory engagement with our surroundings.

Described as both masculine and feminine, visual and tactile, internal and external, erotic and sterile, cosy and futuristic, Ernesto Neto's seductive work is eloquent and engaging.

This exciting new exhibition at DCA will include a work made especially for the small gallery and Neto's largest 'nave', a roomlike environment made of white, translucent lycra material, which yields and changes shape as people move inside. Both the sculpture and the viewer become performing bodies.
